hills, were probably for such purposes. Large brazen *olla*, or culinary pots with sacrificial knives, were recently dug up at Honey-lane market, Cheapside. *Lustricum*, the vessel for containing consecrated water. *Aspersorium*, *Aspergillum*, the sprinkle used for scattering the lustral water. The Romish Church admitted and has preserved this ceremony among its rites. The lamps carried at the funeral ceremonies, which generally took place at night, and many other vessels and instruments employed, were deposited in the tomb, as consecrated by the occasion to the manes.
